We are looking forward to hearing from you. It is important for us to know how well your child's school is involving you in your child's education.

What is the purpose of the Family Engagement Survey? The purpose of this survey is to determine how well your child's school is communicating with you and promoting your engagement in your child's education.

Who completes the Family Engagement Survey? Parents or guardians of students with disabilities who attend school in our district are asked to complete a survey. Districts are asked to participate in this survey once every four years. This year is our district's turn to participate.

Why should I complete the Family Engagement Survey? Our district and the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (ESE) want to hear from families about just how well your child's school is doing in working with you on your child's education. We can use what we learn from families to help make our schools better. Your participation is voluntary, but we really want to hear from you. Your opinion matters!

I have more than one child attending school. Should I complete a survey for each child? Yes, you should complete one survey for each child.

My child receives special education services. Should I complete a survey for my child? Yes, it is especially important for you to complete a survey if your child is receiving special education.
